National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP)







- A voluntary program based on a mutual agreement between the Federal Government and a local community.
- In exchange for adopting and enforcing floodplain management regulations, Federally-backed flood insurance is available <u>to all</u> property owners in the community to protect themselves and their property.
- Greater availability of Federal and State grants/loans (including disaster assistance) for NFIP communities.

Flood Risk Studies

- Conducted to determine insurance and floodplain management requirements, and where to focus mitigations and resilience building
- Areas with reduced risk will see insurance discounts

Federal Program

- Overseen by FEMA and Partners
- Managed by Communities
- Insurance requirement enforced by Lenders.





Risk Mapping Assessment and Planning (MAP)





- High quality flood maps and information/tools to better assess the risk from flooding
- Planning and outreach support to communities to help them take action to reduce (or mitigate) flood risk
- Each Risk MAP project is tailored to the specific needs of communities












Phillips County Mapping Status

- Current Effective Data (2.3 miles):
 - 2.3 Miles of Zone AE
 - Study was only mapped for portions of stream reach inside Holyoke city limits
- Ongoing Detailed Study (City of Holyoke area):
 - 5.2 miles of Zone AE
 - Preliminary as of July 27, 2022








2-Dimensional (2D) Base Level Engineering (BLE) Project Scope





- County-wide 2D Modeling
- Zone A-ready products
 - ~685 miles most will NOT become regulatory
- Actual regulatory portions will be scoped during Discovery
 - Community Input
- Streams included in ongoing Detailed Study will not be restudied










2D BLE Overview







Initiate Phase 2: Detailed Data Development

- Phase 1 (Discovery) Products
 - Discovery Report Detailing 2D BLE results and other hazard information for Phillips County (entire footprint)
 - 100- and 500-year DRAFT Flood Hazard Areas
 - 100- and 500-year Water Surface Elevation (WSEL) and Depth Grids
 - 100-year Velocity Grid
 - Changes Since Last Firm (CSLF)
 - Areas of Mitigation Interest (AOMI)
 - Percent Annual Chance and 30-year Annual Chance grids
 - Hydrologic and hydraulic models and raw outputs (10-, 25-, 50-, 100-, and 500-year storm events)
 - Map package with all spatial data used and/or created from study
